# INSURANCE BENEFITS INCREASED

In July 1966, Estes Industries completed arrangements for a group insurance plan providing life insurance, loss of income and medical insurance for all of its employees and their eligible dependents. The company decided to pay the premium in full for each one of its employees so that no one would be denied the coverage because of economic reasons. If an emplovee chose to extend the coverage for his entire family, the additional premium could be deducted from his pay check.


During the first year of this policy, employees and their dependents received a total of \$14,218,00 in benefits.

Because of the upward spiral of hospital costs, the company decided to increase the benefits for employees. The hospital room and board benefit has been increased from \$15 a day to \$20 a day, and the hospital miscellaneous expense allowance has been increased from \$300 per confinement to \$400 in full plus 75% of the next \$2,000 expense.

For those of us who have insured our eligible dependents, the additional cost will amount to about \$1.53 more per pay period. The company will contin its policy of paying the full premium for employees, including the added cost of this expanded coverage.







#### TV SPECIAL CANCELLED

As you noticed, we weren't on TV last Sunday. This was due to a situation at KRDO-TV which caused the cancellation of our program. The entire KRDO TV SPECIAL was to last an hour with Estes Industries featured during fifteen minutes of the time.
