A native of Canon City, Roy, his wife Lois and their three children enjoy country living in their home north of town.





HAPPY PEOPLE

Jean Curnutte, a three-year veteran, is now supervisor of the Print Shop. This department has doubled its crew within the past few months.


Judy Swift is now the assistant supervisor of the swing shift in the Mailroom. She came to Estes Industries in May, 1966.
