



NEW ENGINE MANUFACTURING BUILDING






Earl's work with electronics dates back to the days of World War II when he and Vern (in junior high) set up their own shop in a converted chicken house and started building and repairing radios. Following his discharge from the Air Force at the end of the Korean War, he worked his way through the University of Colorado engineering school by operating a television repair business in Boulder. Earl graduated in June of 1958 with a Bachelor of Science degree in electrical engineering. Since that time he has been employed by Hughes Aircraft Company, designing missile guidance innards for a number of full scale missiles..

"LAUNCHSTAKES"

Winners of the Estes "Launch-stakes," advertised in the November 1968 issue of the *Model Rocket News* have been declared. First place winner, *Sven R. Englund* of New Canaan, Connecticut, and his parents, Dr. and Mrs. Sven W. Englund, will receive a trip to Cape Kennedy, Florida, to witness a major moon launch and tour the Kennedy Space Center. All expenses, including air transportation, hotel accommodations and meals, will be paid by Estes Industries.

Sven, a fifteen-year old high school sophomore interested in aerospace engineering, indicated that he would like to attend the moon launch now scheduled in July. In August, 1968, he participated in the 10th National Association of Rocketry Aeromodeling Meet held at Wallops Island, Virginia (NASA Station). He takes pride in the fact that his home

town rocket club, the YMCA Space Pioneers, was named "1968 National Champion NAR Section" at the Meet. An active model rocketeer himself, Sven placed second in the "spot landing" event at the NAR Meet.

\$500 college scholarships were awarded to the three second place winners. These were Robert Rodgers, a sixth grader from Norman, Oklahoma; L. William Tabilio, Jr., also a sixth grader from Timonium, Maryland; and Jim Flasck, an eighth grade student from St. Claire Shores, Michigan. There were also fifty \$10 gift certificates given as third place prizes.

The company launched the "Launchstakes" to promote its products at Christmas time and to allow rocketeers everywhere an opportunity to help us celebrate our tenth anniversary.
