




# OPEN HOUSE

Monday, June 23, Mr. & Mrs. Earl Estes held an Open House in their new home. This occasion was particularly significant because their residence (the brick and frame structure on the 'north forty') was the original office building here at Estes Industries.

In 1961, the three-room (cabin) on this sight housed all functions of the company except the operations of the Wood Shop, the Machine Shop and Engine Manufacturing. At that time, even the plumbing consisted of 'the little house behind the big house.' A year later the building was remodeled and the bricked section added. Soon other buildings were constructed behind it.

The reception area, the mail handling departments and the shipping and packing operations were moved in November 1966 to the newly completed "blue building" (structure now housing Packing).



Only a few offices, the Print Shop and the Photo Lab were left "up above."

Finally, our present main edifice was readied for occupancy the week following Christmas, 1967. The old building was abandoned, temporarily, until Art Hunter and Floyd Phillips could transform it into a three-bedroom dwelling. It became the home of Earl and his family when he joined the staff six months ago.



Specially invited guests at the Open House were current Estes employees who were here prior to November 1966 and current employees who have at one time or another occupied this building. Refreshments were served to the 30 guests who toured the home, Electronics Lab and Astron Rocket Society Club House.



## MODEL ROCKETRY AT THE CAPITOL

On Saturday, June 7, 1969 about one hundred model rockets, most of them Estes models, were launched on ''The Mall,'' half-way between the U.S. Capitol building and the Washington Monument. The booth at the Smithsonian where members of the National Association of Rocketry are conducting rocket building demonstrations is located in a most historic setting. Surrounding the




NAR booth are some of the most important vehicles in flight history . . . the Wright Brothers plane, The Spirit of St. Louis, the X-15 rocket plane and the Mercury-7 capsule. In the next room is the display that contains the Estes scale models we have donated to the Smithsonian, as well as some of our other models constructed by NAR members.

The following weekend, June 14 and 15, a new regional rocketry meet (WAMARVA-I) was held at Andrews Air Force Base, Maryland . . . just south of Washington, D.C.
