


R & D team menters -- Il See, Mike Dorffler, Wayne Kellner and John Simmance vanish in a cloud of smoke.





#### DIRECTORY OF UNITED FUND AGENCIES

CAMP FIRE GIRLS, INC. aids community girls to develop their greatest capabilities while learning to cooperate in a group. A portion of the Council funds is set aside each year to purchase camp equipment and provide a permanent meeting place.

COLORADO HEART ASSOCIATION is active in research projects and provides therapy equipment to local residents. With the University of Colorado Medical Center it provides us with services for the diagnosis of rhumatic fever and congenital heart disease.

UNITED CEREBRAL PALSY ASSOCIATION gives practical assistance to families through a Home Service Program. Pre-school and therapy may be arranged at the Rocky Mountain Rehabilitation Center in Colorado Springs. Research is an important part of the program.

ARTHRITIS AND RHEUMATISM FOUNDATION provides information on the most recent techniques and exposes quackery. Locally, it supplies a newsletter to arthritics and sponsors public forums where questions are answered by physicians. The Rocky Mountain Rehabilitation Center treats arthritics with limited finances.

NEW HOPE SCHOOL, INC. serves those retarded and handicapped citizens who have no other source of training. It offers a workshop program for students to earn money by their own efforts.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN COUNCIL, BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA instills self reliance, patriotism and responsibility into today's youth. Funds from U.F. are used locally to assist volunteer leaders with literature, program aids and the help of a trained staff member.

COLUMBINE COUNCIL, GIRL SCOUTS OF THE USA seeks to inspire girls of the comminity to develop high ideals of character, conduct, patriotism and service. It is through U.F. that the local council is enabled to operate.

MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY ASSOCIATION is dedicated to the conquest of a group of hereditary disorders which drain the strength of its victims. This organization offers, free of charge, diagnostic examinations and equipment to make these patients more self reliant.

USO clubs operate wherever servicemen are stationed throughout the world. The USO has been called "America's hometown responsibility on a world-wide scale." It operates soley from donations.

SALVATION ARMY'S continuing program includes groceries for needy families, gas and oil for stranded travelers, and a program of work therapy in rehabilitation programs.

AMERICAN RED CROSS aids victims of disaster on the national scenar as well as serving military personnel and their families. Here at hominstruction is offered in first aid, home nursing and water safety.
