
VOICES FROM THE PAST

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DEPARTMENT VIEWS SAFETY

"What can be done to improve safety and your working conditions?" This was the question Delbert Buchanan, head of Engine Manufacturing, asked each person in his department during the month of March. As a result, the employees in each shift inspected their working facilities and reported on problems that they noticed.

One of the most frequent suggestions the employees made was for each individual to keep his work area employees in Engine Manufacturing felt this would decrease hazards as well as enhance the general appearance of the department. It was

clean. The majority of suggested that the location of the first aid equipment be changed and clearly displayed so that everyone would know where it is in case of emergency. The men also thought that the machinery should be checked more often to prevent possible accidents.

These were only a few of the ideas expressed. 'It was a good start," Delbert mentioned. "Everyone in the department is more aware of safety now. As we continue the program, our accident rate should drop to a minimum."

The Engine Manufacturing Department is to be commended for taking this step toward greater safety. Hats off to Delbert and his crew.

Improving working conditions within the company is a cooperative venture. Estes Industries appreciates suggestions from its employees methods of improving the conditions under which they work. In many cases, problems are not seen unless pointed out by workers in the area involved.

The company's policy is to act as quickly as is possible and practical on suggestions to improve

safety conditions within the plant. For instance: in the Engine Manu-Department facturing special uniforms have been provided for the men; safety features were designed and built into the engine making machines; aluminum hoppers for the propellant feed system are presently being installed, and a program to provide all employees in critical areas of the plant with safety glasses is nearly ready to be instituted.

Carol Bothwell is a new member of the swing shift. Carol, a Florence resident, has little time for reading while rearing her young son Kenny.


The graveyard crew welcomes Ruth Donley, a Florence resident. Ruth, who is originally from Oklahoma, enjoys sewing during her spare time.




children, Russell, Terri, Raymond and Billy.


